AKADEMIYA2063 and the Center for Agriculture and Food Policy (CAFP) Sign MOU for Strategic Cooperation in Strengthening Agricultural Data and Policy Analysis in Zimbabwe

Kigali, Rwanda, July 12, 2021 –AKADEMIYA2063 and Zimbabwe’s Center for Agriculture and Food Policy (CAFP) recently signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) to collaborate in advancing Zimbabwe’s agricultural transformation agenda by strengthening capacities for data generation and policy analysis.

Under the agreement, AKADEMIYA2063 and CAFP will work together to establish and build the capacities of a local analytical network in Zimbabwe and to enable it to meet the data and knowledge demands of policymakers and other agricultural development practitioners in Zimbabwe. The two organizations are already working to strengthen institutional and technical capacities for data collection, analysis, review, and reporting, in support of the ongoing 2021 Biennial Review (BR) process of the Comprehensive Africa Agriculture Development Programme (CAADP), a mutual accountability process for tracking progress in implementing Malabo Declaration commitments.

“Successfully transforming Zimbabwe’s agricultural sector will need to be buttressed by strong data systems and strengthened capacities of local experts who can take a leading role in linking knowledge demand to knowledge supply. That’s what we hope to achieve with this important partnership with CAFP,” said Dr. Ousmane Badiane, Executive Chairperson for AKADEMIYA2063.

As part of the partnership, CAFP will work with AKADEMIYA2063 to develop innovative web-based Information and Technology platforms to support data management, visualization, and investment prioritization in Zimbabwe; leverage opportunities for joint research on strategic and emerging research topics; and co-organize country and regional learning events that advocate for agricultural transformation in Zimbabwe and Africa.

“Given the mammoth task of rapidly transforming the agricultural sector and achieving accelerated recovery, this partnership with a highly competent technical and continental institution like AKADEMIYA2063 could not have come at a better time for Zimbabwe. This will be quite a big boost for our technical teams and experts,” said Dr. Tobias Takavarasha, CAFP Board of Trustees Chairperson.
